

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

Are your savings and investments suitable for you?







STRAW

n popular sayings and phrases, "straw" generally refers to something which is considered worthless, such as 'Not worth a straw' – valueless, not worth a rap or a fig etc.; 'To care not a straw' – not to care at all.

Straw gains importance in other sayings such as, 'A straw shows which way the wind blows' – mere trifles often indicate the coming of a great event, they are shadows cast before coming events; better known now as, 'Straw in the wind'.

In the straw – was applied to women in childbirth. The allusion is to the straw with which beds were stuffed at one time, and not to the litter that was laid outside a house to break the noise of wheels as carts passed by.

The last straw – the only hope left, the last penny.

Tis the last straw that breaks the camel's back – in weighing articles such as tea, salt and sugar etc. it is the last pinch which turns the scale and likewise – a series of small events that have collectively brought an individual to the point of endurance beyond which the situation becomes intolerable or irreparable.

– to resort to an inadequate remedy in des-

To draw the short straw – to draw the shortest straw from within a bundle of straws and be entrusted with an unpleasant task.

Farming Paradoxes 2 The Legacy

of the Slave Trade

developed country is radically different from that which was lived by someone three or four hundred years ago. Until recently, almost everyone was prepared to believe that this change was for the better, and that, sooner or later, everyone on the planet would have a chance to partake in it. Nowadays, we are not so sure - some aspects of the change may not have been as good as others, and we are having to accept that if everyone lived the same consumer lifestyle as those in the most developed countries, it would almost certainly lead to a resource crisis, and a global environmental disaster.

Farming is one of the fields of activity that has changed the most, and in order to sort out the good from the bad, it is worthwhile to look at each successive change, what brought it about, and the long-term benefits that accrued from it.

The Economy Before Innovation

The history of modern farming is often told as a series of remarkable inventions - starting with bigger ploughs and ending up with satellite-guided combine harvesters - each of which brought about an agricultural revolution; but this version fails to explain why these inventions should have taken place at one particular time and place, rather than at any other point in human history. Economics provides the answer.

In Middle-Ages Europe, agriculture dominated all aspects of economic life; there were different models, ranging from feudal estates to independent, small-scale farms, but no matter what sort of farming they were practising, rural communities were self-sufficient - not just in food and fuel, but they also manufactured most of their tools, and made their own clothes. There were manufacturing centres, but demand for their products was limited, and did not grow from one year to the next. Similarly, there was a certain amount of trade, both within Europe, and between Europe and other parts of the world - mainly the Middle East, Central Asia, India, and China. Demand for European products was fairly limited, and that restricted the amount of luxury products that merchants could afford to import from the affluent Eastern civilisations. Essentially, Europe had a fairly robust, sustainable economy that did not grow, or decline, much over periods of time - even if there were fluctuations due to political instability, warfare, and disease.

This all changed with the discovery of America. Politically, Europe was divided into many different countries, but, even so, it still operated in many ways as a single economy. One of the main economic consequences of the discovery of America was an increase in the demand for European manufactured goods. Initially, this was on a relatively small scale, and mainly involved producing the goods needed to fit out the ships that were going back and forth to the New World, but it still had a radical effect on communities across the continent. In Brittany, for example, it led to a dramatic rise in the number of people working in the textile industry, specialising particularly in supplying the spiraling demand for sail cloth.

As time went on, the demand for manufactured goods further increased, as they became integral to the Atlantic slave trade. European slave merchants loaded their ships up with cargoes of European goods that they hoped to be able to trade for slaves in Africa. At the time, African rulers had little interest in money, but they did want some of the goods manufactured in Europe, including copper items, iron, textiles, alcohol, glass goods, weapons, and trinkets.

The Impact on Agriculture

The immediate effect of the rise in manufacturing activity in Europe was that some people to moved off the land to work making things that were destined for sale. This meant that there were fewer people on the land, but that they were still

expected to produce food not just for themselves, but also for people in the towns. Initially, this probably just involved working a little harder to produce a surplus. It must have seemed like a development in which everyone won: for the first time people in the countryside were able to earn money from their day-to-day activity. At first, no new agricultural innovations were required: people were already skilled in the use of animal traction, fallow land could be brought into production, and large surpluses could be produced from land that had a good store of long-term fertility.

However, two factors related to the discovery of the New World made the situation more complicated, and, perhaps, prevented Europe from finding a new point of balance between manufacturing and agriculture. The first of these was the large amount of gold and silver that was brought to Europe from America in the early years of Spanish occupation. It gave rise to inflation and a devaluation in the value of the currencies in circulation. The phenomenon was little understood at the time, and probably led farmers to selling their produce for less than it was worth, and, as a result, even though they were working harder, and producing more, they did not find themselves better off. The second factor was that many of the products coming back to Europe from the new world were relatively new, and people did not know what their true value might be, and how much they should be prepared to pay for them – these products included tobacco, chocolate, and, most especially, sugar, which was introduced into America in some of the earliest voyages of discovery. In this environment, farmers found their status downgraded; their produce was not regarded as being as valuable as some of the imported products, and they became vulnerable to being exploited by a new emerging class of merchants and landowners.

The sugar trade, in particular, became a dominant factor in the European economy; more slaves from Africa were needed all the time for the plantations, and the slave traders became more demanding as to what they wanted in exchange for the people that they were offering for sale. More goods had to be manufactured, more workers were required, and more people left the countryside to work in the towns. People found themselves in a condition of

acute poverty, and ready to adopt changes in the way that they farmed, even if they were not necessarily a genuine improvement on traditional methods - anything to increase the saleable yield.

As more countries became involved, the European economy moved from being based around selfsufficient communities, to being a money economy, and the countryside started to concentrate on produce that could be sold to feed the growing urban population - which meant growing more cereals, and raising more livestock, with the help of fewer people. Previously-common-land was enclosed, highlands were cleared, bigger horses were bred to pull bigger ploughs in bigger fields, and the use of the scythe was perfected, so that larger areas could be harvested in less time by fewer people. None of these refinements of ancient techniques were designed in themselves to improve anyone's quality of life, nor to produce better quality food, nor to improve soil fertility; they were a practical response to an economic pressure.

By the time that the Atlantic slave trade was outlawed, Europe's manufacturing economy had taken root. Many of the mechanisms developed to run the slave trade were found to work well in the new colonial era, which also relied upon the trade of manufactured goods to bring wealth from other parts of the world, back to Europe. By this time, people were beginning to say that the technological advances linked to the development of the manufacturing industries, were bringing tangible advantages to ordinary people's lives, which, perhaps, further fuelled the move towards a money economy - and put further pressure on people in the countryside to produce more, so that they could afford the modern luxuries available to townsfolk.

Threshing the grain was the bottleneck in the early commercial production of cereals, and this was resolved by the introduction of the threshing machine onto farms in the early eighteenth century. It did not represent a true agricultural step forward: it could thresh vast quantities of grain, but, in the process, broke up the straw, making it unusable for thatching. Over time, this had the effect of further impoverishing people in the countryside. The increased production of grain caused the price to fall, but people now had the extra expense of having to pay for roofing materials. Nevertheless, the

threshing machine augured the gradual process of mechanisation of farming, which led to horses being replaced by tractors, and men with scythes being replaced by satellite-guided combine harvesters

As the process of mechanisation gathered pace, and chemical fertilisers were developed, a hundred or so years ago, voices were raised questioning what was happening to soil fertility, and to wildlife; this was the start of the 'organic' food movement. Its leaders were able to attract enough public attention, both in Europe and the United States, to make many people question the direction in which agriculture was heading. However, commercial pressures, combined with the need to keep feeding people in times of war, plus the near-miraculous way in which science and industry managed to come up with short-term solutions to the problems being created by the new agricultural methods, meant that these concerns were largely ignored. Chemicals were introduced to compensate for the decline in soil fertility. Which brings us to where we are today.

The main achievement claimed for the agricultural revolution of the past few hundred years is that it has freed people from having to work on the land, making them available for other forms of work. Another way of looking at it is that economic pressures drove people off the land, thereby depriving them of the autonomy that comes from living close to nature; and the people who remained in the countryside found themselves having to adopt agricultural techniques that have led to the impoverishment of the soil and the destruction of wildlife.

Some of the legacies of the Atlantic slave trade are being acknowledged, but there is still the idea that it was an historical episode in which there were winners and losers. It might be better to see it as an enormous mistake, a form of madness that harmed everyone that it touched. The urban populations of Europe are the descendants of country folk driven from their land, deprived of their rights, and forced to work for an odious system of human exploitation. The countryside still bears the scars of this misadventure, suggesting that the underlying malaise has not yet been healed.

EDUCATION #5 The Third Year At Secondary School

Quatrième (year nine in the UK) is a pivotal year. It is the year which requires your child to start making a number of major decisions. The choices made will affect their post-secondary life. It is also important to note that you ought to work closely with teachers and school counsellors. Whether your child is thinking in terms of an apprenticeship, planning for college or considering going to university, here are some suggestions which you, as a parent, may want to take on board.

- · The child must be made to understand that it is a foundation year. It is not a year for having a rest.
- · Teachers prefer to have in their groups those students who show the potential to do well and the willingness to do well.
- Talk to your child about the importance of having a good education. Talk about careers you find interesting and about the possibilities open to them with a good education.
- Explain that they are now at a major set of crossroads and that year nine is a time for redoubling their effort. Point out that it is now highly likely they will be going in a direction different to that of their friends. Impress upon them that they should choose an optional subject because they like it, because they find it interesting and strongly believe they can do well in it and not because their friend wants to do it.

The idea is to encourage the student to do some advanced reading on the options chosen. The youngster can even spend some time strengthening those areas in core subjects like maths, English and science, where they may be a bit weak. This enables the young student to begin cinquième with greater confidence in themselves and their ability to succeed.

During the summer holidays, it may be a good idea to arrange for your child to visit a place connected with what he or she would like to do later on.

Way Off the Beaten Track Jervaulx Abbey

"But yet I know, where'er I go, That there hath past away a glory from the earth." William Wordsworth

he North Riding of Yorkshire – I refuse to use that abomination "North Yorkshire" that obliterated 1300 years of history at the stroke of a bureaucrat's Bic biro – has four great abbeys: Fountains, Rievaulx, Jervaulx and Byland. I was taken to Fountains as a child, but was too young to appreciate it. Nor at the age of ten did I have a clue about the Reformation, Cardinal Wolsey and the odious Henry VIII. Last year, when we were staying near Ripon, we tried to visit Rievaulx, but it was closed due to the heatwave (q.v. CBJ August '22), so when we were in Yorkshire again last month, I was determined to visit it, or Jervaulx. We chose Jervaulx since it was closer and, as ever, we didn't have much time.

Jervaulx abbey, the guide book tells us, is distinguished by being "one of the largest privately owned abbeys in the UK". Are there others? It was a Cistercian Monastery – cue quick search to discover the difference between the Cistercians and the Benedictines. The Cistercians, also known as the White Monks, were a monastic order that was founded in 1098 at Cîteaux (Cistercium in Latin) in Burgundy. They were Benedictine monks "dissatisfied with the relaxed observance of their order, who wished to live a solitary life under the strictest interpretation of the Rule of St. Benedict."* St. B, meanwhile, had established his Benedictine Rule half a millennium earlier in 535 A.D. The "Rule" provided a "complete directory for both the government and the spiritual and material well-being of a monastery by carefully integrating prayer, manual labour, and study into a well-rounded daily routine."

In our secular, materialistic age, I find it hard to understand why shutting yourself away and living a Cenobite life of flagellation and denial was thought by some to be a good way of serving God. My prosaic nature makes me think that any Gods worth their salt might think it better to go out and be useful. True the monasteries were the guardians of knowledge and learning, but again, what's the point of learning if you don't do anything useful with it? Knowledge is power, perhaps?

Ah, I wade into deep waters and am already way out of my depth, so I will stay with Jervaulx as it is today. I suppose without Henry's narcissistic indulgences (Trump and Johnson spring to mind), the English monasteries might have lasted until much later. And who knows how our society might have developed? One benefit might have been that the magnificent buildings survived. As it is, we are left with faded magnificence, tinged with melancholy.

The ruins are glorious, if you like that sort of thing, which regular readers of my ramblings will know I do. Jervaulx today is due to the first Earl of Ailesbury, who owned the site in the early 19th century. He instructed his agent to begin a programme of "excavating and preserving" the ruins and to lay them out as a garden. It is also a credit to the present owners, who have conserved and developed the earl's legacy, funded by their commercial activities and the voluntary contributions of visitors.


From the car park you approach through open parkland. Disinterested sheep, clearly well-used to visitors, bask in the sun and look lazily on. A shrub pushes up from the vestiges of an ancient tree, young perhaps in the early 16th century, but long since laid low by a storm. At the entrance, you are invited to contribute £10 per person to an honesty box and to purchase postcards and a guidebook. I would love to know if the contributions correspond with the number of visitors. Whether they have any way of telling, I do not know. I didn't see any surveillance cameras.

You pass a carved monk before you arrive at the haunting ruins themselves. Walls stand tenuously, vacant arches lead nowhere, a small window gives on to pasture where distant sheep graze... As with all such complex ruins, you need time to comprehend where you are, and what you are looking at. And, as it seems with all my visits, not to mention life, there is never enough.


My Favourite Place to Take Photographs: **Grand Tranche and Créharer**

started to look around for places to walk the dog. It just so happened that one day having been to the shops, and having ticked the appropriate box on my authorisation to go out. I stumbled across this area of the Nantes Brest canal.

It was a quiet day, with few people about, so I went for a walk. We have come to these regions for many years mainly because of the quantities of Eelgrass and other seaweeds, however after a serious blight in 1931 our numbers dropped alarmingly and those that did come were forced to change their diet, venturing a short distance inland to feed on grasses and winter grown cereals. Shooting us was also made illegal and helped with the numbers which began to rise again, with our diet remaining more varied.

We are often seen in small groups flying along the coast low above a rough sea. We rarely fly in V formation preferring a right angled one. Our chorus is largely made of a deep single-note "Kowk".

The story revolves around the hero's quest to solve a puzzle related to his Breton grandmother's estate.



T is for Temple

t Cos Ilis, Plestin les Greves, 22310, you will find the site of a Gallo-Romain Temple.

Located on the Grand Rocher plateau, the site served as a temple between the first and third centuries. The building was a place of prayer, open to all. It was 12 metres long on each side, and dominated the town. It may have had pre-Roman origins, with the site being an ancient Celtic holy place. Between 1988 and 1990 the department of Antiquities of Brittany and the municipality began excavations, and in 2017 the site was made accessible to the general public.

T is for Therms Hogolo

hese Hogolo Thermal Baths overlook the Plage des Roches d'Argent, Plestin les Greves, 22310. They are a vestige of the Gallo-Roman era (1st – 4th century A.D.) Baths were once integrated into the properties of the wealthy notables settled in Brittany and, unlike the Temple, not open to all!

The goal was to warm up the body, sweat, and bathe in very hot water in order to rid the body of all impurities.

The last step after passing through the warm room and the hot pool, was the cold pool to reinvigorate yourself. Even today it is possible to distinguish the different elements that made up the thermal complex.

They may seem small but they were the standard size for the time. They were discovered in 1892 by a local resident who was digging their field. In 1938 Colonel Peres, then a municipal councillor of the town started excavations. The site as we know it today was cleaned and restored in 1991 and 1992.

Mustard Crusted Chicken Escalopes (for 4)

2 large chicken breasts, skinned Salt and black pepper 50g/2oz dried breadcrumbs 3 tbsp Dijon mustard Finely grated zest of 1 lemon 2 tbsp sunflower oil

4 eggs

Lemon wedges to garnish

Slice each chicken breast lengthways to give two thin portions. Place between cling film layers and beat with a rolling pin to flatten them to a uniform thinness.

Season both sides of each breast portion.

Sprinkle the breadcrumbs evenly on to a large plate. Spread one side of each breast generously with mustard and press into the crumbs, mustard side down. Spread the other side with mustard then sprinkle with lemon zest. Press into the breadcrumbs to coat the second side.

Heat 1 tbsp sunflower oil in a non-stick frying pan and pan fry the escalopes for 1-2 minutes on each side or until golden brown and cooked through. Drain on crumpled kitchen paper and keep hot.

Wipe out the frying pan with kitchen paper and add the remaining oil. Fry the eggs.

Serve each escalope topped with a fried egg and tossed salad or potato salad on the side.

Thai Style Mango and Prawn Salad (for 4)

1 ripe mango

½ cucumber

1/2-1 red chilli, deseeded and finely chopped

1-2 tbsp sesame seeds

100g mangetout, halved

2 red peppers, deseeded and thinly sliced

300g white cabbage, thinly shredded

20 raw tiger (or other large) prawns, shelled and deveined

Olive oil

8 wooden skewers

For the Dressing:

1 tbsp grapeseed oil

1 tsp sesame oil

1½ tbsp runny honey

1 tbsp soy sauce

Juice of half a lemon

Peel the mango and cut the flesh away from the stone. Cut into dice and place in a large serving bowl.

Halve the cucumber lengthways, scoop out and discard the seeds. Cut into small dice and add to the bowl with the chilli, sesame seeds, mangetout, peppers and cabbage.

In a jug, whisk together the salad dressing ingredients and season well. Pour over the salad, toss together and set aside.

Thread five prawns per person on to double wooden skewers to make it easy to turn them while cooking. Heat a griddle or large frying pan over high heat. Brush the prawns with a little oil and cook for a few minutes, turning occasionally, until pink and cooked through.

Divide the salad between four plates and top each with a prawn skewer

Fruit Shrub

A SHRUB is a delicious fruit infused drinking vinegar to use in cocktails, mocktails, salad dressings and sauces. It is an old way of preserving the essence and flavour of fruit.

2 cups* fresh berries of choice (*1 cup =250ml)

1 cup cane or caster sugar/honey/agave syrup

1 cup cider vinegar

Place the fruits and sugar in a bowl and mash lightly together. Cover with cling film and set aside at room temperature for 24 hours.

Strain the mixture into a large jug, pressing the fruit gently to extract as much juice as possible, then discard the pulp. Stir in the vinegar and pour into a sterilized bottle or container. Seal and keep in the fridge for up to six months. The flavour improves with keeping so let it "mature" for a couple of weeks at least.

This recipe also works with ripe peaches, mangoes etc. If using rhubarb, cut into $1~\text{cm/}\frac{1}{2}$ " dice and marinate in the sugar for 3-4 days, covered, stirring every day, then proceed as above.

For a refreshing pick-me-up try a tablespoon (or more) of shrub in a glass of ice cold sparkling water.

It is a particular favourite of the brimstone butterfly.





Tim the Gardener

The weather in July proved to be something of a surprise: instead of having the drought that the dry start to the summer seemed to presage, it rained almost every day. This was very welcome in the vegetable garden, but the weather patterns do seem to be becoming more erratic. I follow the debate about the impact of human activity on the climate quite closely, and, it seems to me to be generally missing the point. Most of the argument is about the scientific evidence for climate change, and scientific predictions for the rate of change, how much temperature will change here or there, what effect this will have on the ice cap, on glaciers, on the permafrost, on sea level, etc. So far, by my estimation, none of these predictions have proved to be accurate, they have all had to be revised from one year to the next, and any new data collected is always a surprise. meaning that everything has to be re-calculated.

Clearly, the planet, and all the interactions between its living and non-living systems, is far more complex and intricate than we, as human beings, have so far been able to understand; and, logically, there is no reason to believe that we even have the capability to understand it.

That is why I believe that the sensible approach to climate change is to try, as far as possible, to reintegrate oneself into the natural world. That is, rath-

er than trying to understand it (and control it) from the outside, work with it from the inside – become a gardener!

Grass Cutting


Last year, I delayed cutting some areas of my garden right up until December, mainly because I was overwhelmed by other jobs in the summer – but it worked quite well. I could use the cut material directly as mulch without having to find some way to temporarily store it first, and the grass did not grow again until the spring, so the area remained looking neat and tidy for several months. It also gave a chance for ground-nesting birds, small mammals, and insects to complete their life cycles relatively undisturbed.

Harvesting Onions

I will be pulling up my onions soon, they seem to have benefitted from the July rain, but I will take care to dry them thoroughly before storing them for winter, laying them out in the sun in wooden trays, and taking them in and out of shelter if the weather continues to be showery.

Potatoes

I plan to lift most of my potatoes towards the end of the month. If I leave them in the ground too long, I lose a lot to mice. I will store them in a temporary clamp, and move them to a winter clamp in the autumn.
